Assignment #1: Famous Photographer Presentation

Objective:

Embedded Interview: Find and embed a YouTube video of an interview with the photographer. If an interview is not available, a documentary or video slideshow of their work is acceptable.

3.Informative Slides:

- a) Slide on Style: Discuss the distinctive style and techniques used by the photographer.
- b)Slide on Impact: Explain the photographer's influence on the world of photography and any significant contributions they have made.
- c)Slide on Additional Insights: Share interesting facts, anecdotes, or any other relevant information about the photographer.

- •Work together so all your photos look good together (same theme or style).

4. Create a Gallery on Redwood. Photography

- •One person (the group leader) makes a robogallery on redwood.photography.
- •Upload all the group's photos to your gallery.
- •Give each photo a title and a short description or caption.

5. Present to the Class

•On the final day, your group will show your gallery to the class.

Guidelines:

Content Appropriateness: All images must be suitable for a high school audience.

Image Quality: Use proper composition, lighting, and exposure techniques. Edit images if necessary to enhance quality (brightness, contrast, cropping).

Teamwork: Communicate regularly with your group. Share ideas and provide constructive feedback to each other.

Technical Proficiency: Utilize the features of redwood.photography effectively. Ensure your gallery is accessible and navigable.

Photo Challenge Options:

You may choose from the following challenges or refer to the 52-Week Photo Challenge book

- **1.Black and White Photography:** Create compelling images focusing on contrast, texture, and composition without the use of color.
- 2. Forced Perspective: Use optical illusions to make objects appear larger, smaller, closer, or farther away than they are.
- **3. Macro Photography:** Capture extreme close-ups of small subjects to reveal details not visible to the naked eye.
- **4. Street Photography:** Document candid moments in public places, capturing the essence of daily life.
- **5.Reflection Photography:** Use reflective surfaces like water, mirrors, or glass to create artistic images.
- **6. Light Painting:** Use long exposure times to capture moving light sources, creating patterns or writing.
- 7. **Minimalism:** Focus on simplicity and use a minimal number of elements within the frame.
- **8. Silhouettes:** Photograph subjects as dark shapes against a brighter background to create dramatic images.
- **9. Patterns and Textures:** Find and capture repeating elements or intricate textures in your environment.
- 10.Motion Blur at night: Use slow shutter speeds to convey movement within your images.
